What is a Qualified Person (QP)?

- An individual who is:
 - Chartered
 - Suitably qualified
 - Suitably experienced
 - Attended the DoWCoP course
 - Achieved 80% or above on the QP test
 - Independent from the project
 - Demonstrate annual and relevant CPD
 - Registered with CL:AIRE as a QP (annual renewal)



What is the role of the QP?

- Check if the assessment follows current land quality guidance
- Check all receptors have been suitably considered
- Check if the scheme follows the principles of DoWCoP
- Check the submission deals with material accountability
- Check all appropriate lines of evidence are included in the Material Management Plan submission:
 - Suitability
 - Certainty
 - Quantity



What a QP does not do!

- Technically review reports / recommendations*
- Agree or audit remediation strategy or design statement
- Produce verification report
- Undertake dialogue with Regulators
- Decide if material is or is not waste
- Sign off innovative solutions that seem like a good idea, but do not adhere to the CoP

^{*} Professional integrity with fundamental errors are the exception

QP qualities

Confident

Demonstrates a clear understanding of the CoP

Ability to apply professionalism & integrity

Able to say no!



So QP declaration – what is the point?

- Confidence to regulators
- Reduces duplication of effort
- Ensures the liabilities and responsibilities involved in the project are clear
- Looks at responsibilities
- Improves timeframes
- Provides part of the audit of the Code of Practice



QP review timeframes

always before the event

- Site of origin before material reuse
- Direct transfer before material is dispatched to the receiver site
- For each 'new' donor site
- For significant changes in volume
- For peace of mind!

Finding a QP

- Register on CL:AIRE website
- Ask CL:AIRE to allocate a QP
 - International soil passport
 - CoP users following disciplinary procedures
 - Voluntary option for complex sites
 - If the registered list seems a bit daunting!
